

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report evaluates some of the successes of the activation as well as opportunities for improvement, some of the key successes and improvement opportunities are:

Key Successes

On June 15, 2022 the County Board of Supervisors adopted a new Extreme Heat Hazard Annex. The updates removed specific temperature thresholds, and instead, began setting thresholds based on National Weather Service HeatRisk data, which better accounts for heat impacts on the body. The Severe Weather Guidance was activated for unusually high temperatures, which posed a risk to the public for several days. Successes included coordination calls and coordination of logistical supplies for the efficient operation of cooling centers. Partnerships with County Libraries were strengthened to allow for two consistent facilities (Southgate and Arcade Libraries) in prime locations for the unhoused to visit. Fixed SacRT routes were established in order to move residents to/between cooling centers.

Key Improvement Areas

<u>Transportation</u>: Identify ways to increase ridership between encampments and cooling centers.

<u>In-camp assistance</u>: Identify ways to provide in-camp assistance during extreme heat events.

<u>Fatalities</u>: Work with Public Health and homelessness advocates in order to provide information on the effects of drug use and severe weather, as well as provide encouragement for the unhoused to sign up for Sacramento Alert.

KEY CHRONOLOGICAL EVENTS

May 23, 2022

Initial meeting with Operational Area (OA) partners to begin planning for summer cooling center operations. Purpose of the call is to go over roles/responsibilities of each agency, severe weather guidance and a time for the NWS to provide us an overview of the summer predictions and any new information pertinent to Sacramento County.

May 24-25, 2022

NWS published a Heat Advisory from 12pm on May 24th to 11pm on May 25th. Department of Human Assistance decided to open two lobbies from 2pm to 8pm.

June 20, 2022

NWS published a Heat Advisory from 10am on June 21st to 10pm on June 22nd. We conducted an OA partners Weather Call. Department of Human Assistance, Citrus Heights, Elk Grove and Sacramento City opened cooling centers.

August 15, 2022

NWS published a Heat Advisory from 11am on August 16 to 7pm on August 20. We conducted an OA partners Weather Call. Department of Human Assistance, Citrus Heights, Elk Grove, Galt, Folsom, Rancho Cordova and Sacramento City opened cooling centers. The California Independent System Operator issued a statewide Flex Alert for Aug. 17, from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m.

September 4, 2022

NWS issued an Excessive Heat Warning from September 4 to 9. We conducted an OA partners Weather Call on September 4. SMUD did not need to initiate rotation outages, but Flex Alerts were issued each day from August 31 to September 9. Sacramento City, Sacramento County OES, Elk Grove, Galt, Citrus Heights, Folsom, Rancho Cordova and Sacramento County Department of Human Assistance opened cooling centers between August 31 and September 9.

Plan Review

On June 15, 2022, the Board of Supervisors adopted a new Extreme Heat Hazard Annex. The activation criteria below are based on the new plan.





Figure 1: Chart depicting the actual temperatures and Hospital Emergency Department (ED) visits for the period of April 1st - Sep 30th 2022.

Coroner Report

At the time of publication, the County Coroner has determined that the following deaths during summer of 2022 were, or possibly were, heat related. The Coroner may verify additional deaths later and remains the official source of death reporting for Sacramento County.

Case Number	Date	Description
22-05212	9/3/22	49 year old male. Death certificate with heat stroke listed as cause of death was sent to us. The decedent apparently died on 9/3/22 and UCD Hospital failed to report it to us. He was living with his girlfriend so he had an address, but she may have kicked him out and he may have been staying in his van the day he died. He was found near the address listed for his residence at Huntsman Dr. and Parfait Dr. Cause will be listed as Hyperthermia.
22-05420	9/9/22	57 year old female that was brought in by ambulance today, 9/9/22, from her home in Antelope and died in the ER at Mercy San Juan Hospital. She had unknown medical hx. Her air conditioner stopped working at the beginning of the week and the temps in her home had been in the 90's according to witnesses. Cause will be listed as Hyperthermia.

STRENGTHS

Extreme Heat Guidance

The update Extreme Heat Guidance proved successful during numerous heat events.

Strength 1.1: Coordination calls and coordination of logistical supplies for

the efficient operation of cooling centers

Partnerships

Strong partnerships allowed for quick communication and establishment of cooling centers with little lead time.

Strength 2.1: Partnerships with County Libraries allow for two consistent

facilities (Southgate and Arcade Libraries) in prime locations

for the unhoused.

Transportation

Precoordinated routes and pickup/dropoff locations and times allowed for a predictable ride to cooling centers.

Strength 3.1: Fixed SacRT routes allowed for the movement of residents

to/between cooling centers.

AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT

Transportation

Regional Transit worked with the County and Sacramento City to establish bus routes and pickup locations between the different cooling centers. Busses were also used to move residents from cooling centers with high attendance to those with lower attendance in order to increase capacity. The hard part is getting those that need assistance to use the bus service.

Improvement 1.1: Identify ways to increase ridership between encampments and cooling centers.

In-Camp Assistance

Based on low ridership from the unhoused, the County needs to work with CBOs, FBOs, etc. to provide some level of in-camp support to ensure those residents have appropriate water and respite from the heat.

Improvement 2.1: Identify ways to provide in-camp assistance during extreme heat events.

Fatalities

There were two fatalities attributed in some part to the effects of heat. That is one more than last year.

Improvement 3.1: Work with Public Health and homelessness advocates in order to provide information on the effects of drug use and severe weather, as well as provide encouragement for the unhoused to sign up for Sacramento Alert.






Referrals to Cooling Centers May 24 - September 9, 2022
